## Impressions about the Comenius SPUREN project

I'm Roberto Sonedda, a student from Villasor, a little town in the South of Sardinia, Italy.

Some of my schoolmates and me have been chosen by our school, Liceo Alberti, to participate in the Comenius "SPUREN" project and in May 2014 we had the opportunity to be at the "European Week", which took place in Paderborn, Germany (where the coordinating school is).

We stayed there in a nuns' old convent and then, few days after our arrive, we did some activities, through which we could socialize with other students that came from different European states. At the beginning we felt pretty well there and we started communicating with some Lithuanian students through a funny table game, but later we also chatted with other participants coming from Finland, Hungary and Bulgaria. Since the first moments, therefore, we could learn lots of information and curiosities concerning other students, such as their hometowns, hobbies and schools.

On the day before we left, a real "treasure hunt" was organized all around the streets of Paderborn. For this activity we were divided into several little groups, with participants of different nationality. This treasure hunt was probably one of the best activities organized, as we had the chance to visit the town, see the landmarks of the place and interact with all the members of our group. Probably, the organizers of this activity (the teachers from the school in Germany which coordinates the project) wanted to suggest something. I think the idea was that it doesn't matter if we are all different or where we come from, what really counts is to collaborate to reach the same goal, a thing that many adult people haven't learnt yet.

I can say with certainty that this project was really enjoyable and amazing. It also gave us the opportunity to improve our knowledge about new cultures, new people and new thoughts; besides, during these days we had to use English to communicate, a thing that at the beginning seemed difficult, but finally we managed to speak pretty well with everyone.
